Local Plant to Provide Storage Sheds To Four State Region

"A tradition of quality" is an appropriate label for Old Hickory Sheds, a Tennessee company that is known as "a leader you can trust" in the portable storage industry for over twenty years. That success has come from providing their customers with dependable storage solutions and a quality buying experience. Take notice Belle Fourche, the rapidly expanding Tennessee company is investing part of its future with us.

It was the soundness of that reputation and the opportunity to be a part of a progressive business enterprise that led Michael Dirks to move with his family from Missouri to western South Dakota. When asked about his relocation to the area, he commented, "We moved, largely to undertake this project, but we also liked the area and had some friends that live in the area, too." His background is in beef cattle and metal building industry. Prior to Missouri, Dirks spent 13 years in Wisconsin in the dairy business with his father. He projects a spirit of the work ethic gained in his dairy experience and his business acumen as he energetically talks about the business and the direction it is moving.

Dirks and his wife Sylvia live in Nisland. They have four children: Ty, age 12, Jordan, 9, Rachel, 8 and Jared 6. The four siblings will be attending Christian school in Newell this fall.

You may have noticed a large stock of storage sheds of various sizes and shapes just south of Belle Fourche on the east side of Highway 85. The property once belonging to Homer Moncur, was that purchased by Old Hickory Sheds. During our spring's wet

weather, the red metal skinned building underwent a steady transformation with the installation of work bay doors, partitioning and concrete flooring. The company which currently has five employees has been in production for about a month and has assembled and built, to date about forty units. Dirks stated, "when we've been rolling for a while that is a number that should only increase." The facility will provide the production for retail shed sales for a four state region: Western North and South Dakota as well as eastern Wyoming and Montana. The brick house on the property is being converted into an office and sales facility.

Old Hickory Sheds is a nationwide company that chose Belle Fourche to be the site of a regional "build facility". They

will provide a wide assortment of shed possibilities from the production facility. Old Hickory owns the property and the facility and has contract with Dirks to build the sheds for the retail outlets in the four state region.

In addition to managing and operating the build operation, Dirks will also own and operate a retail outlet at the location. The "build" territory includes 100% of the Belle Fourche trade area plus a larger geographic area in all directions. The next closest build facilities are in Evanston, Wyoming and Billings, Montana. To the east there is a "build" facility in southwest Minnesota that serves that surrounding region. Old Hickory has over 700 independent retail outlets and they are

BELLE FOURCHE - It seems only natural that an incoming activities director would hit the ground running and that's exactly what Adam Nowowiejski did. Nowowiejski, a local business owner and former BFHS football coach, was hired earlier this spring as the school district's new A.D. and has spent the last three months shadowing long-time outgoing director Clay Anderson.

"Holy cow, that was valuable information and learning from him first hand was just awesome," he said. "Clay did just done a phenomenal job with everything."

One thing Nowowiejski learned from his predecessor is that moving from head coach to activities director would be like night and day.

"For one thing it's managing all the different programs," he said. "You have numerous coaches and activity advisors. There are a lot of different personalities that you have to be able to communicate with and work together with to achieve the goal of which is making the experience the best possible for the kids and putting them in a position to be the most successful as possible."

Nowowiejski will be responsible for overseeing athletics, band, choir, FFA, one-act and drama among many other duties. But he says he is enjoying

the challenge. He began meeting with coaches and directors in April and although he knew most of them already he says it's been a pleasure meeting some new faces as well.

"Essentially it was all about getting on the same page as them with the expectations and goals that we'd like to achieve," he said. "And I have some high aspirations and goals."

At the top of the list for Nowowiejski is what he calls "showcasing" the talent of the students within the Belle Fourche school district. He hopes to celebrate their achievements and "get them out front and center." By doing so he hopes to inspire other students around them to achieve greater things and have more ownership and pride in their school.

"One of the great challenges is - and it's a challenge everywhere - is to inspire and motivate kids to participate," Nowowiejski told the Beacon. "Obviously we have a great student body that participates in activities, but there's a lot of kids that can participate as well and I think they just need to have more ownership in their school; be inspired to have a say, have a voice."

"And I want them to have memorable experiences in high school and want to help create those experiences with them," he continued. "To create a more fun atmosphere, things

bors at the apartment building she lived at for over 27 years.


Ben was preceded in death by both her parents, Bernard "Barney" and Clara Stoltz and her sister, Leotta "Lee" Keyser.

Irene Kinghorn, age 88 of Belle Fourche, died Sunday, July 28, 2019 at the Hospice House in Rapid City, with her loving family by her side.

Her life will be celebrated 10am Thursday, August 1, 2019 at the United Methodist Church in Belle Fourche, with Pastor Sheri Fadley officiating. Visitation will be held Wednesday at Leverington Funeral Home of the Northern Hills in Belle Fourche, from 5 to 7 pm, with a time of sharing at 6pm. Interment will take place in Black Hills National Cemetery.

Irene Christine Jacobsen (Kinghorn) was born September 14, 1930, in Lead, South Dakota in the home of a nurse friend (mid-wife) of her mother. She was the daughter of Jens and Roxie (Hopkins) Jacobsen. Irene grew up and attended country school in Carter County, Montana. At that time, to pass the 7th and 8th grade, students had to take and pass county achievement tests. Her Mother presided (proctored) over many of these tests for the area kids but obviously could not proctor over Irene's own testing.

Shortly after graduating from the eighth grade, Irene's parents sold the ranch to the Williams family. Florence & Shirley Hett, Irene and her mother moved to an apartment in the upstairs of the Pritchett grocery store, at which time Irene started High School in Belle Fourche in the Fall of 1944. Shortly after that they moved to a house across from the Jail and in 1947 Irene and her mother moved to a house on 4th Ave. that her mother purchased. The house was large, so she boarded elderly persons and high school students to make ends meet. Her dad, Jens, worked for a rancher north of Belle Fourche, working long hours, Irene said Daddy hardly could come home.

After graduating from Belle Fourche High School in 1948, Irene enrolled in nursing school. She took a bus to Miles City to join the new students at which time they all took the train to Aberdeen to complete their 6-month probationary period. Upon completion, they received their caps and returned to Miles City for training. During the 3 years of training Irene joined her classmates in Glenn Lake, MN for 6 weeks to train at the tuberculosis sanatorium, and Creighton Hospital in Omaha NB for 3 months of psychiatric training. She completed her training in Miles City and graduated with a diploma in nursing in Septem-



ber 1951. After graduation, Irene passed the dreaded state boards and returned to Belle Fourche to work at John Burns Memorial Hospital. During this time, her Dad had a stroke and returned to the house in Belle Fourche. Her mother cared for him until his death in 1952.

Irene met Leonard Kinghorn at the St. Onge supper club while working in Belle Fourche. They were married in Belle Fourche in 1953. They lived at the home ranch at the Two-top Buttes until 1959 at which time they purchased and moved to a ranch on Redwater River located

southeast of Belle Fourche. There they raised their 3 children, Patty (Thomas), Dave and Mike. The three children still live on the ranch.

Irene worked as a nurse in Belle Fourche for Drs. Marousek and Sherrill for many years, and at the Belle Fourche Medical Center with Jim Bohl, coming to know many of the residents of the area. After selling the cattle, Leonard and Irene purchased a motor home and set out on a journey to visit every state in the continental US and collect a magnet while there. Unfortunately, Leonard passed away in July of 2012 but apparently, they collected all 48.

Irene loved playing bridge, gambling in Deadwood and volunteering at the Tri-state Museum. She was devoted member of the United Methodist Church and participated in anything she could to stay busy. Four weeks ago, she was diagnosed with cancer and she passed away at the Hospice House in Rapid City on July 29th 2019.

Irene is survived by her children, Patricia (John) Thomas of Belle Fourche, David (Reggie) Kinghorn of Belle Fourche, Mike Kinghorn of Belle Fourche; 8 grandchildren, Jeff (Kelly) Thomas, Jeremy Thomas, Jennifer (Mark) Kennedy, Jessica (Kasey) Keller, Lyndsy Kinghorn, Krystina (Jerome) Kinghorn, Stefanee (Darrel) Prawalsky, Shawn Damberger; and 8 great grandchildren, Bryn and Sophia Thomas, Nyla and Tara Kennedy, Noah and Finley Keller, and Elsie Doochen. 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
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4-H My Story: Colin Hockenbary

Parents are also asked to bring a copy of the child's birth certificate and immunization records.

All students planning to attend High School in Belle Fourche must register at the High School office on August 6 between 7:30 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. or August 7 from 7:30 a.m. to 4:00 p.m.

We encourage the use of EZSchoolPay to pay fees for student activity tickets, annuals, class dues, laptop fees and student meal accounts. Visit the District's website at www.bellefourcheschools.org under Parents for additional information on EZSchoolPay.

If not using EZSchoolPay, students should bring \$25.00 for an activity ticket. Adult tickets are available for \$35.00. This ticket will be for admission to athletic events. Freshmen, Sophomore, and Junior class dues are \$3.00. All class dues are to be paid at the class meeting which will be held on the first day of school. 2018-19 High School Annuals will be on sale during registration for \$35.00. Annuals purchased after January 1st will be \$40.00.

Sophomores, Juniors and Seniors will report to the High School gym on Friday, August 16 at 7:50 a.m. for an assembly. They will be on an abbreviated schedule and will be dismissed at 11:15 a.m. No lunch will be served this day. No buses for high school students this day.



We were surprised and gratified that our circulation of 8,600 would place us at the fourth largest newspaper circulation in South Dakota! In addition, largest among all the weeklys; and second largest of western South Dakota papers.

The Beacon is not on the SD Newspaper Associations list because you have to be a legal newspaper to join the association.

The first requirement of becoming a "legal newspaper" in South Dakota is to publish at least once weekly for 51 out of 52 weeks of the year. The Beacon believes that publishing for one year is a good rule. We will pass that milestone later this year.

Another current require-

ment is the type of Postal Permit required. We currently distribute the paper to 100% of households in the area. Under permit qualifications we would be restricted in that distribution. You may not distribute to a number more than equal to your number of paid subscribers. We have had good subscription support from you, the readers, but hope you will help us over the next several months in our efforts to become a legal newspaper.

We will maintain the current distribution and again will ask if you feel that the news, information, and advertisements that make up the Beacon are of value to you to please show your support by way of a yearly subscription. We thank you for your consideration and as well as a thank you to those that have already subscribed throughout the past year and will to continue to participate by renewing for the second year.

We always feel a little embarrassed mentioning the need for you help with subscriptions but was reminded by this quote: The fool wonders, the wise man asks. Benjamin Disraeli



Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center to hold class on "Kitchen Chemistry"

The Tri-State Museum and Visitor Center will hold a class for kids in rising 4th through 6th grade, entitled "Kitchen Chemistry" on Friday, August 9 from 10 to noon. The class will be taught by summer staffer Ally Drabek.

This class will introduce some basic concepts of chemistry using household items and include experiments demonstrating the sensory difference between natural and artificially produced scents and flavors; producing endothermic reactions in eggs and reproducing stomach acidity with basic household acids, such as lemon juice and vinegar. 

NEWELL – “The fundraising for the gym floor started around February of 2019,” said Steve Schoenfish, athletic director for the Newell school district. “The donations varied in size.”

Schoenfish said that the floor needed to be resurfaced as it was around 15-years-old and had several areas that the finish was starting to peel, making for a very slippery surface, which is dangerous to the athletes.

Following the fundraising process, the school hired Derkson Floors of Rapid City to do the refinishing, as they were the company that originally put the floor in.

The refinishing has been a process, but it didn’t take very long. The company began on July 15 and the work went fairly quickly. They finished the process on July 22, but it will be August 8 before the floor will be able to be used.

Letters were sent out to many in the local area to announce the fundraising campaign. At that time the floor, which was installed in 2004-2005, was showing age and wear. The expected cost was to be approximately \$20,000, and at the time the letters were sent out the school had already raised around \$7,000 toward the renovation.

There will be a wall of fame featured on the north end of the

gymnasium, where two foot by three-foot placards will be hung, celebrating the donations as well as promoting the business or family history.

The donation fees were: 1 year-\$300, 3 year-\$500, and 5 year-\$1000. There is an option to renew the donations on June 31 of the corresponding year they expire.

The vision for Austin Auditorium was to provide a safe place for the students/athletes, as well as create an inviting environment for family, friends and visiting towns.

“We feel our school is the hub for not only the students, but also the community to get together and socialize while cheering on local teams,” said Schoenfish. “Newell school is very grateful or all the support the Newell/Nisland/Vale, and the surrounding areas have provided for us, and we hope to continue making Austin Auditorium a facility we can all be proud of.”

Schoenfish said he wanted to thank all the businesses and community members who donated to the project.

“We could not have done it without the support of all of them,” said Schoenfish. “If interested, there is still the option of purchasing a 2x3 placard to advertise a business, ranch or farm and help support the maintenance of the floor.”

August 5, 1909

The young man, in company with some of his countrymen, was in swimming and one of the men crossed the pond. Papowich attempted to follow and when near the middle of the pond, he was seized with cramps and sank before his companions could rescue him.

July 31, 1919

Mintener warns, coal is cheaper now than it will be later on. There is no advantage in waiting, in fact, you may not be able to get all of the “Labeled Coal” you want if you wait until July or August. Thousands of cars will be needed to move the grain crops and there will not be enough cars for both grain and coal. Better buy now it’s a duty you owe your family and community. This announcement brought to you by Peter Mintener Lumber Company, on 3rd St, Newell.

On Wednesday morning a train-load of stock left Newell for St. Louis; 28 cars made up the train and 1 of these cars contained hogs, the balance was load of 375 horses comprised the shipment.

Dale Tribby of Sturgis, who has been buying horses in this section, shipped 375 head and Wendt and Horton Bros of near Castle Rock shipped 3 cars. An additional 25 cars were shipped this week from Belle Fourche.

August 1, 1929

A survey from the air confirmed the judgment of those who selected Rushmore Mountain for the National Monument, Gutzon Borglum, the sculptor, said today. He took a 3-hour air plane trip over the Black Hills Sunday and decided it was no other mountain standing out to a degree that anyone could suggest, why wasn’t it put there. Mount Rushmore was selected after a survey from the ground; this was his first view from the air. Mrs. Boglum, their son Lincoln, Mrs. Lorraine Spootz, Corpus Christi, Texas a photographer and newspapermen were also onboard.

M. E. Hafner received a call from Belle Fourche this week asking him to be on the lookout for a Stewart-Warner truck loaded with 14 sacks of wool, stolen from one of the wool warehouses in Belle Fourche early Saturday morning. No trace of the robbers had been reported this week.

August 3, 1939

W.J. Mahoney and Jack Ryan of the Stratosphere Mattress Service, Rapid City, were business callers here the middle of the week and last Friday moved their equipment to Newell to locate temporarily in the old Dunn Building, they plan to be here

several weeks. Fred Baker and Mrs. Hubbard are the additional members of the crew. They will be building and rebuilding cotton and innerspring mattresses and doing upholstery. The name “Stratosphere” was adopted after they had completed a cushion upon which the camera equipment used in the stratosphere flights was mounted. The cushion is now on display with the other equipment at the World’s Fair.

Virginia, 7-year old daughter of Mr. & Mrs. Wm. Wise of Newell suffered a severe concussion of the brain last Saturday evening when she fell from a box car near the depot, where she had been playing. She was brought to the local hospital for treatment but did not regain consciousness until Sunday morning, when she was taken to Rapid City for further treatment.

July 28, 1949

The 2-motor airplane which made such an impression in Newell on Tuesday wasn’t a mystery to Mr. & Mrs. Anton Kulisich, All though it did have many here guessing. It was flown by T/Sgt John Kulisich of the US Marines, Cherry Point, North Carolina. Kulisich had flown the plane to Rapid City Air Base Sunday and drive up to visit his folks and other relatives while the plane was being overhauled. He checked out Tuesday and made several passes over Newell in the process, before leaving for his Base Wednesday. The black plane he piloted is a F7F, “Tiger”, a fast

and powerful model.

Mr. & Mrs. Reggie Pickard, owners of the Arcade Theater at Newell now know the movie business from start to finish, having returned from a several weeks trip to the west coast. They revealed one of the highlights was seeing four films actually in production in Hollywood. At the MGM watched production of “Stars in My Crown” starring Joel McCrea, Alan Hale and Dean Stockwell; at Warner Bros Studios “Chained Lightning” with Humphrey Bogart, Richard Whorf, Ray Massey and Eleanor Parker and at RKO were 2 films “Bed of Roses” and “Terror”. They were privileged to spend one night at the residence of Jane Darnell, another movie star.

July 30, 1959

It’s OK to strip mow cover on soil bank land according to Thomas E. Hamilton Director of the Soil Bank Division of Department of Agriculture. There is nothing in the Conservation Reserve regulations which would prevent mowing of the established cover so long as there was no harvesting of the material mowed and so long as the mowing does not destroy any of the cover.

Attention has been called to the fact that an adult in the city was nearly on the receiving end of some air rifle pellets one afternoon last week. Air rifles are fine instruments for use in safety and marksmanship training, but it is illegal for same to be fired

within the city limits of Newell. Sometime earlier all the windows were shot out of a motor vehicle believed to be shot out by a child with an air rifle, but could not be identified. State law now makes parents financially responsible for all damages caused by their children, but parents are also morally responsible to see that our children are taught both obedience and respect for laws and city Ordinances.

August 1, 1979

July has had the most humidity recorded since 1962 and it was muggy. Thunderstorms and some severe wind struck the night of July 24 & 25 and early 26. In all, the rain fell, temperatures hit the high 90’s and nights were in the high 50’s. Humidity was up to 86% at times. On July 24 morning, the mosquitoes were so bad that they covered humans like pepper.

Tri-County Lockers’ new building in Newell, to be used for slaughtering beef, pork and mutton, will open for business, hopefully, within two weeks. Carl & Mark Jarnecke, owners, say they can hold 8 beef at a time in the new 44’x28’ kill facility. A state inspector, who was looking over the operations July 15, complemented the men on installing such an up-to-date sanitary slaughtering plant which far exceeds required state, county and city sanitation regulations. Butchering will be done strictly by appointment, 2 or 3 days a week.

Sallmen Cousins' Reunion in Vale

Forty Finnish descendants and friends of the John Sallmen Family of Oulainen, Finland met at the Vale Community Center July 13, 2019 for a meal catered by Terri Brunch, Sturgis, of the Felion branch of the relationship. Carolyn and Bob Ruff and Orville and Kathy Edqards of Vale were hosts. Carolyn, as MC, read notes of information from family members unable to attend and a table prayer sent by Charlotte Pauley, Claremore, Oklahoma.

For the 9th Triennial gathering of the family group people traveled from six states: North Dakota, Minnesota, Nebraska, Iowa, North Carolina, and South Dakota. Cheryl Hofer, Spearfish, and Gayle Cutshall, Rapid City, registered the guests. The largest proportion of the guests were descendants of Matthias and Liisa Haivala who settled in Harding County in 1900.

For the first time, the branch of the Ericson/Karinen family were represented at the reunion. Sharon Auldreich of Burnsville, MN played a recording of a country song written by her father, Bill Karinen of Hard-

ing County and Spearfish.

Annette Oppedahl of Chapel Hill, North Carolina and rural Deadwood told of her September 2018 trip to Finland, which included a visit in Oulainen from which all the descendants present had roots. The beautiful parish church there, surrounded by a large cemetery was served by Sallman family members for seven generations. Positions included assistant pastor, cantor or song leader, administrator, and supervisor of building and grounds.

Mrs. Oppedahl also told of the subway system which now serves Helsinki. In comparison to the American diet Finnish people generally eat more fish; berries, both wild and domesticated; mushrooms; whole grain breads, especially rye; and fermented milk products with much less sugar than in the US.

Also, fairly recent is much ferry traffic of workers and tourists traveling between Helsinki and Tallin, the capitol of Estonia. The 90 minute trip is south across the Baltic Sea. Since the fall of the iron curtain and Estonia becoming a free country the "Olde Town" is being restored and is a very popular tourist site,

one of the best old towns of Europe. The large stone wall surrounds cobblestone streets and buildings dating back to the 1600's.

Mrs. Oppedahl concluded her presentation by reading the Lord's Prayer in Finnish so attendees could hear the native language of the Sallmen ancestors. Some attendees visited Snoma Finnish Cemetery where the oldest South Dakota family member, Marie Liisa Sallman, who immigrated in 1881, is buried. Donations, after expenses, will be divided between the Vale and Snoma Cemeteries.

Because of the age of current committee members this reunion of the Sallmen cousins was the last unless younger people volunteer to organize it.




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Rodeo Legend J Pat Evans Dies



COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. – The rodeo and sports world lost a legend and pioneer in Dr. J. Pat Evans.

Evans, one of the founders of Justin Sportsmedicine Program, who was inducted into the ProRodeo Hall of Fame in 2004, passed away July 22. He was 88.

The Justin Sportsmedicine program was initiated at the 1980 National Finals Rodeo in Oklahoma City and Evans, along with Don Andrews, was a driving force in making that happen.

Before Evans envisioned the Justin Sportsmedicine, program and worked to get it started, there wasn't anything organized for providing medical care to rodeo athletes. In 1981, the Justin Boots Company became the only sponsor the program has known in its years of service.

"Justin Sportsmedicine was my dream," Evans told 1978 PRCA World Champion Bull

Rider Butch Kirby one time in conversation. "He was like a father to all of us. Cowboys used to go to Forest Lane in Dallas to see Dr. J. Pat so they could get fixed up. When he fixed cowboys and we won, he won also."

ProRodeo Hall of Fame bull rider Donnie Gay knows Evans is irreplaceable. "The world is a better place because he was here," Gay said.

Rick Foster, who is the program director for the Justin Sportsmedicine team, was glad to have known Dr. J. Pat.

"He was mentor for all of us, and great educator of rodeo sports medicine, and the best professional friend anyone could have," Foster said.

And, Evans loved treating cowboys. "The cowboys are the toughest guys on the planet," Evans said through Dee Chambliss, a family friend prior to his passing.

The reach of Evans' influence

in sports medicine is far and wide, and especially on Dr. Tandy Freeman, the Medical Director of the Justin Sportsmedicine team.

"To begin with, he (J. Pat) was one of my mentors," Freeman said. "He is one of the people who has had a profound impact on my life. I wouldn't be where I am, doing what I'm doing, if it hadn't been for J. Pat. When I first met Dr. Evans, I was a resident in training, I hadn't decided what I wanted to do.

I was doing an orthopedic surgery residency, but I hadn't decided what area I wanted to focus my attention on whether it was going to be sports medicine, double-joint replacement or something else. "The thing about J. Pat that was the most influential on me was witnessing the relationships he had with his patients. How he talked to them and took care of them. It was a really personal form of medicine, nowadays it would be considered old-fashioned. He helped me determine how I wanted to go about dealing with patients and taking care of patients."

Then, Freeman made the choice to practice what Evans did. "I decided I wanted to do sports medicine and then one day he called me up and said he was getting ready to retire and he wanted to know if I was interested in taking care of his old patients," Freeman said. "That had huge implications because he was really talking about the rodeo athletes he had taken care of over the years. The Justin Sportsmedicine torch is still his, I'm just holding it to pass it on.
